President's Message

Dear Friends,


Well, it looks like we can finally get out in larger numbers and enjoy ourselves at long last. We are all looking forward to a summer on the lake and river. However, the scorching weather should serve as a reminder that Climate Change is real and is having real-world effects on life in the valley today and it will

be an on-going part of our future. We have been lucky this year to have had a good snowpack which has been feeding the lake for the last few weeks but the last of the snow on Heather Mountain melted during the last week in June. And with climate change seriously upon us we can no longer rely on the snowpack for spring flows which reinforces the need to raise the weir.

Weir Update: The first part of the Weir Design process is almost complete. The design packages are nearing completion and were reported out publicly on July 8th in a public webinar. The work on the Shoreline Assessment has also been forging ahead complete with wave monitoring this winter and an amazing on-line tool which shows specific lines on every property on the lake of exactly where the natural boundary line is, the lake levels of the old weir and the new weir, as well as property lines, the CVRD Riparian zone line and the average high water line, all super imposed on high quality images. Our Watershed - Through a Creative Lens History Meets Climate






Watershed Board on a program called Our Watershed - Through a Creative Lens - History Meets

As reported in our last newsletter CLRSS has joined the Decibel Coalition which is actively lobbying the Federal Ministry of Transportation to regulate unmuffled boat engines on our lakes. The campaign is gaining momentum nationally and most recently the CVRD Regional District passed a motion to join the Coalition and support its objectives. CVRD joins a number of other municipal representatives from around the country in the coalition as well as the Youbou Community Association, the Shawnigan Lake Residents Association and CLRSS from here on Vancouver Island.

Fry Rescue Update

Joe Saysell reports that he was able to finish up all the fry rescue work in the upper part of the Cowichan River this year. He was glad that Brian Houle of Catalyst Paper was able to postpone the reduction of the river flow from 15 cms to 7 cms for an extra day allowing Joe and his crew to move the last of the fry from the side pools into the mainstem of the river so they can get up into the lake where it is cooler for the summer. Now with this hot weather the next focus will be on checking for stranded fry in the pools of the tributaries to the lake.


Cowichan Shoreline Stewardship Project

We are collaborating again in 2021 with BCCF and doing riparian plantings along the shoreline of Cowichan Lake. This year's project leader is Elodie Rogers who is working with Genevieve Singleton, Dave Polster and Craig Wightman as advisers. She has a crew of young workers from LCS, Cowichan Tribes and a university student and they began work this wee. Last newsletter we reported on the removal of riparian vegetation on a beach on a Youbou property following its sale this winter - following intervention by fisheries and CVRD Bylaw enforcement officers the beach is being re-vegetated under the supervision of Swell Environmental Consultants.

Report an Environmental Concern

The Province of B.C. relies on the public to report activity that causes pollution to the environment. By reporting <u>pollution</u> you are helping us act promptly to minimize harm to the environment and public health.

The RAPP program is a toll-free tip line and online service that also allows you to report known or suspected violations of fisheries, wildlife, or environmental protection laws anonymously and without risk of confronting the offender.
